Where Faith and Life Collide

Dear Church Family,

April 1 marks our 1-year anniversary at First Baptist Church of Coos Bay. As I was thinking about what I should write for the April Lifeline edition, I thought, this is a time to pause and reflect back on our first year together. So, I pulled up my first Lifeline article. It was about our getting ready to enter the Easter Season. I would like to include two paragraphs from that article.

As we enter the Easter Season, we need to remember this simple fact, "He is risen!" We do serve a living Savior. Stop and reflect on this simple fact for a moment. We..... do serve a living Savior. And His name is Jesus.

Our triune God—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit decided, before the creation of the world, that Jesus would come into this world and die for the sins of those who believe in Him. "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life. (John 3:16, ESV)

I ended that article by saying that it was a time of wondering what will the future hold, and that we will strive to ensure that the future is controlled by, led by, and dominated by the Lord Jesus Christ and His Holy Word.

Little did I realize a year ago, how prophetic that first Life Line article would be—how uncertain our future (even the world's future) would be, but three things have not changed: (1) I remain dedicated to my promise that I am personally committed to the Lordship of Jesus Christ in my life, the life of my family, and the life of our beloved church; (2) I will continue to preach His Word as boldly and accurately as I am able; and (3) God is still sovereign above all creation.

What does it mean when we say, "God is sovereign above all creation?" The word sovereign comes from a root word meaning "above others." When we apply it to God, it means He is above everything because He created everything, because He is omniscience (all knowing), and because he is omnipotent (all powerful). It is because of these attributes that we, as Christians, can calmly say with Paul, "I have the power to face all such situations in union with the One who continually infuses me with strength." (Philippians 4:13, Gerald F. Hawthorne).

So, my beloved church family, in this time of uncertainty, the world is looking for answers. Answers that they will not find, unless they turn to Jesus. Yes, we are in a period of darkness but as King David said, "If I say, "Surely the darkness shall cover me, and the light about me be night, ¹² even the darkness is not dark to you; the night is bright as the day, for darkness is as light with you." (Psalm 139:11, 12 ESV). So, stay focused on Jesus, stay focused on the Word—not on the world. Stay calm. Use this time to be the light of Jesus to the world. Remember Jesus told us, "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. Nor do people light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven. (Matthew 5:14–16 ESV)



Wow! I'm not sure if anyone saw this coming even a month ago! I sent an email out the middle of March to everyone in our real estate office. It included this excerpt from Corrie Ten Boom's book, The Hiding Place and a few verses in 1 Thessalonians 5: 16-18 does a good job of summarizing the idea, "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you."

The barracks where Corrie ten Boom and her sister Betsie were kept in the Nazi concentration camp Ravensbruck were terribly overcrowded and flea-infested. They had been able to miraculously smuggle a Bible into the camp, and in that Bible they had read that in all things they were to give thanks, and that God can use anything for good. Corrie's sister Betsy decided that this meant thanking God for the fleas.

This was too much for Corrie, who said she could do no such thing. Betsie insisted, so Corrie gave in and prayed to God, thanking Him even for the fleas. Betsie and Corrie would often quietly share passages from the Bible with the other prisoners, ever mindful to be careful to avoid being overheard by the guards. If caught, the punishment would be unthinkable. Even without provocation of this kind, the guards regularly assaulted the women. Over the next several months a wonderful, but curious, thing happened. They found that the guards never entered their particular barracks. This meant that while in the barracks the women were safe from assault. It also meant that they were able to do the unthinkable, which was to hold open Bible studies and prayer meetings in the heart of a Nazi concentration camp. Through this, countless numbers of women came to faith in Christ.

Only in the end did they discover why the guards had left them alone and would not enter into their barracks. It was because of the fleas.

What can we be thankful for in the midst of the circumstances we find ourselves in?

As I walk the trail through my neighborhood, I see unnamed flowers beginning to poke their heads through the hardened ground, cracking it, with small bouquets of green in the dried, weathered foliage. I am always amazed the way flowers come back in the spring—the tulips that surprise me each year with their colors and the ever multiplying iris from past years, as well as those flowers whose names I am still learning on this beautiful Oregon Coast. As I venture through the countryside, I pass a stable with numerous horses—sometimes romping, sometimes grazing—and on occasion, giving birth. Watching a colt struggle to its feet for the first time, still wet from its mother's womb. Spring—a time for birth and rebirth. That's what the resurrection is all about. Walk down this path

with me.

As I leaf through my New Testament, I am reminded of the role women played in Jesus 'life. God chose the vehicle of a woman's womb to bring His Son into this earth. He entrusted this woman to parent His Son to adulthood. This Son, this Jesus reached out and touched women, bringing healing to their bodies, comfort to their broken spirits, and forgiveness from their sins. You see, a group of women travelled with Jesus.

Scripture tells me in Matthew 27 (describing the crucifixion scene) that there "were many women there, looking on from a distance, who had followed Jesus from Galilee and helped Him." (GNB) These women sat at His feet—listening, learning from Him, and accepting His unconditional love—not a sexual love—but a love that would wrap itself around them and bathe them with a warmth that none in the world or any man could ever provide.

This Jesus, He, too, was planted into the ground, in the still coldness of death, only to await for that morning when He, too, would free himself from His grave clothes, and push death aside, forever conquering it – THE resurrection—HIS resurrection! Mary Magdalene, the first person to speak to my resurrected Lord—and the joy He brought to her! "Go tell my disciples!" But I bet she shouted the news to her friends along the way! You see, these women experienced resurrection—but more than that, they experienced THE resurrection—dying to sin and being raised into a new life through this resurrected Jesus, this Son of God, this friend of women. New life, new birth, new creation—through our resurrected Lord—the friend and companion of women. Something to think about. . .

Happy Resurrection Sunday, my precious friends! He is risen; He is risen indeed!

There are so many needs spiritually and physically, and it appears that the resources to meet those needs are disappearing. I asked myself how do I share the financial needs of the church and balance it with the financial needs of our church members. Some of you are already struggling financially. Then I was reminded - I may not know what the future holds but I do know who holds the future. God is in control. Three scriptures in particular came to mind.

- "And my God will supply every need of yours according to his riches in glory in Christ Jesus." Philippians 4:19
 ESV
- "Fear not, for I am with vou: be not dismaved, for I am vour God; I will strengthen you, I will help you, I will uphold you with my righteous right hand." Isaiah 41:10 ESV

- Live-Streaming on Facebook: First Baptist Church began live-streaming Sunday worship on the church's Facebook page at First Baptist Church of Coos Bay OR. As of this writing, 817 people were reached and there were 462 engagements for the March 22 service. That's a few more than our usual Sunday attendance. While this doesn't replace gathering for worship on Sunday mornings, it's a way for our members to get into God's word and connect.
- **Daily Devotions:** To encourage more connection, Pastor James also began a Monday Friday daily devotion that he live-streams on Facebook. It's called *The 8:28 Moment* based on Romans.
- Active Website: Videos of both of these can be found on the church's website at www.cbfbc.com under Community/Communications. Also posted at that link are the most recent Lifelines.
- Active Prayer Chain: We've also created a page on the website where church members can see updated prayer requests. Because of the delicacy of some of the prayer requests and the fact that everything posted on the internet is there forever, the page will be password protected. The password is "XXX XXXXX". We asked that the password not be shared with the general public. We will still email prayer requests.
- Care Calling: The Board of Directors will be calling members of the congregation on a regular basis to pray with you, assist with needs when possible, and just have a chat. They will also be verifying/updating your information so we can better communicate with you.

Mission Moment

I want to talk to you about the presentation by Kathy Ireland for the Pacific Pregnancy Clinic on February 22 of this year. Her presentation shows how someone who started being pro-choice can switch to pro-life.

Kathy Ireland first became pro-choice after Planned Parenthood came to her school when she was about 16. Planned Parenthood told the girls that if they got pregnant it would be their choice if they had an abortion or not. They wouldn't have to tell anyone, including the father of the child or their parents. She liked that she could have that kind of control over her own body. Then when Kathy was in her 20's she went to Europe to start her modeling career. The place that she was staying at in Europe did not really have very much for a young woman to do. Kathy said she was bored when she noticed her mother had packed a Bible in her luggage. She started reading the Bible and soon became a Christian, but she stilled believed in a woman's right to choose abortion, if she wanted.

Later in her modeling and movie career Kathy went to an audition for a movie that was so supposed to show both sides of the pro-choice and pro-life argument. She said that it was clear to her that it was biased toward pro-choice by the way they were portraying the pro-life characters in the script. She also said that right before her audition they told her it was important that she was pro-choice, and they wanted her to affirm that she was pro-choice, which she did. At this time God put on her heart that she may be in the worst position she could be in by straddling the fence between being a child of God and believing in pro-choice. This bothered her enough at the time that she blew her audition. On her way home she decided that she wanted to do research on both pro-choice and pro-life

Since her husband is an emergency room doctor, she had access to a lot of medical books in her home. She wanted to find out when the medical books said a human first became a human. What she found out was that the moment of conception a human being was created right down to the eye color and sex. She showed her husband what she found out since he was also pro-choice. He told her he couldn't believe how much he had his nose in the medical books without actually seeing what the books said about when human life started.

At this time Kathy Ireland started leaning toward being more pro-life, but she still wasn't ready to completely give up on being pro-choice. She decide to talk to some abortion clinics and asked them to give her their best argument for pro-choice. What they told her was that if the abortion was done early enough it was just a clump of cells and didn't even resemble a baby. She then told them what the medical books said about the start of human life and switched to being completely pro-life.

This makes me wonder how anyone could be pro-choice if give the facts as the medical and scientific world defines the start of human life

Rick says he's always had a hard time talking about, or dealing with, his feelings and openly admits to using drugs to kill his pain & feelings. He's learned that the pain is always there when you wake up. His new goal --- to "better myself one day at a time, and stay sober..... and keep my heart with the Lord."

When I asked him what we could do to help, he says "I'd like all the prayers I can get." Rick says working makes him feel good. But, I worried a paycheck would be a temptation, as it has been in the past. For now, he's working for the Mission on laundry, minor repairs, serving meals, and supervising residents.

Rick tells me in the past, he hated AA & NA (narcotics anonymous) so it never stuck. We signed him up for Celebrate Recovery (a biblical recovery program), and he loves it. The other strategy that Rick is working on is adopting a whole new set of friends – sober, Lord loving people.

Pray with me that THIS time, the captive is FREED. Amen.
